Ruxley Church Anniversary with Jongikaya Khasa

Stoneleigh Methodist Church were invited to join Ruxley for their church anniversary in January, and we were truly blessed by the ministry of Jongikaya. He was a such a thoughtful gentle man, and we could tell he was a mighty man of God. Of course, there were a lot of inspiring things in his sermon and it would be far too long to tell them all. The article following is his summary of ways to cultivate joy. But as I'm writing this, I can share one of the things I took home with me, which is that we should attend church expecting to be changed. We cannot enter God's presence to worship Him without laying ourselves open to the working of His Spirit. *Vivienne*



Jongikaya (London District Chair) ended his talk at Ruxley with these remarks:

Our knowledge of God, worship of God and service that honours God; though challenging at the best of times, must be from a joyful place and not just a sense of duty. We must want to have more joy in our day. We Can Cultivate it! True Joy springs from viewing our day's events from 'eternity's perspective'. We have to work intentionally and focus in proactive ways so as the joy we have within us can be shared consistently with gentleness and respect (c.f. 1 Peter 3:15-16).



1. **Rehearse with God the reasons you trust Him.**

Tell Him which of His attributes is your favourite right now. Read the praises of Scripture back to Him — begin with Psalms 103:1. Join with another believer in prayers of thanksgiving and delight yourself in God's character.

2. **Keep a "joy journal"**. Record the reasons you have to rejoice and the reminders of God's faithfulness that you encounter in your everyday life. In addition, why not press a leaf from your prayer walks into its pages or include a photo of a person that brings you joy each time you remember him or her? *You may want to expand your journal into a "joy box" or a "joy drawer" that brings a smile to your face each time you open it.*

3. Surround yourself with joyful people. Joy is contagious — so build relationships with friends whose lives exhibit their joy, contentment and confidence in God. Pray for each other that your joy in Christ would continue to increase.

4. Approach life's challenges and trials in hope redemptively. God doesn't waste the difficult circumstances of your life but uses them to develop His character in you. Review Romans 5:1 and James 1:1 for help in processing pressure productively. Joy will sneak up on you when you view your hardest lessons as gifts from God.

5. Make praising God [& self-praise and gratitude] a habit. Has God met a need? Praise Him! Have your challenges given you greater opportunities to see God at work? Thank Him! Joy flows from a grateful and responsive heart. Before you sleep at night, write down three to five blessings in your "*joy journal*." Make it a habit, and watch your joyful attitude grow.

6. Fill your mind [& life] with music. Listen to, sing, and meditate on music that draws your heart nearer to God and His Word. Learn a new song or start listening to new genres of music whilst avoiding music that returns you to thoughts of people you'd rather move on from.



7. Take the long view. Investors advise their clients not to worry about the daily ups and downs of the stock market — what matters is the long view. Does life present incredible challenges today? Are your reserves at a low, or are you enjoying a content plateau? Regardless of today's events, take the long view. Remember that God remains in charge of your days and will faithfully develop His character in you. Don't forget that joy springs from viewing the day's events from eternity's perspective. Trust that God controls your life's details (Romans 8:28), that He hears your every request (Psalms 116:1), and that His joy will be your strength (Nehemiah 8:10).

Introduction to the 3rd Order of St Francis; TSSF

Gopal attended a recent Tuesday Fellowship meeting and introduced those present to St. Julian, an anchoress from the Middle Ages who, for much of her life, lived a life of prayer and contemplation in permanent seclusion in a cell attached to a Church in Norwich. Jeananne and I often attend the monthly Julian meetings held at St Mary's Church in Ewell during which we engage in contemplative prayer and meditation.

St Francis of Assisi is renowned for his love, simplicity, and practice of poverty. He lived in the 13th Century and was the son of a very wealthy Cloth Merchant. When he was young, he was an ambitious man whose aim was to succeed in his army career! However, he was wounded and when ill he went to church and saw Christ on the San Damiano Cross speak to him saying



‘Build my Church’. At first, he took it to mean that he should physically re-build the churches but soon realised he was meant bring others to Christ by living a life as Christ did.

He sacrificed a comfortable life-style and lived his life as a hermit. Others joined him and as time passed, more and more wanted to join his way of life. So with the Pope's permission he started the Franciscan order. Today there is a “First Order of St. Francis” which consists of men and women who live in a community under a Franciscan Rule based on the traditional vows of

poverty, chastity and obedience. The second order was started for nuns, and they became known as the Poor Clares. Later, when St Francis visited Cannara, - a small village near Assisi - his words and work charmed many and the response was overwhelming – both by people and even birds and animals. Many wanted to join him and his community but he saw it was not practical for them to abandon their families and join an order which was celibate.

St. Francis therefore founded a third way, the 3rd Order of St Francis** – TSSF.

Members of TSSF “profess”, i.e. promise, to live out the Gospel according to the example of Francis.

The Aims of the Order are:

- To make our Lord Jesus Christ known and loved everywhere
- To spread the spirit of love and harmony
- To live simply

I belong to TSSF. I have made a commitment to follow a God-centred Rule of Life whilst living in my own home and serving within the community (and interacting with my five grandchildren!).

I have been asked to share with my friends at SMC my thoughts on how TSSF impacts on my daily life and my spiritual engagement.

The three ways of Service we promise are:–

***Prayer** - Aim to live in an atmosphere of praise and prayer, aiming to be constantly aware of God’s presence.

***Study** - priority is given to studying the scriptures and applying Christian principles in our daily living.

***Work** - by understanding what God wants us to do and finding ways of fulfilling the three aims of the Order in our work and lives.

We, the members of TSSF, are known as Tertiaries and we desire to be conformed to the image of Jesus Christ whom we serve through prayer, study and work after the example of St Francis and St Clare. We live by the Personal Rule of Life which we decide ourselves in association with our mentor. We review this annually before we remake our promise every year. In summary we need to practice love, humility and joy. Needless to say, I don’t always succeed! - But I am trying.

I have no doubt that becoming a Tertiary has been a wonderful life-changing experience and a major burst forward in my spiritual journey; and moreover, I have found much peace in my previously stress-filled life.
