

3rd Stoneleigh Scouts, whilst very keen to return to normal scouting as soon as possible, have continued their 'virtual scouting' with online meetings using Zoom each week.

All sections have had fun and productive evenings, and all Leaders are now exhausted and grateful for the summer break. Here is a flavour of some of the activities each section has completed.

Beavers have played a lot of games, including zoom charades, guess who and bingo. The children's favourite game was the Scavenger hunt where they had to run around their home collecting certain items as quickly as possible. They have had two 'sleepovers', one with a VE day theme where the children had activities to complete such as baking and word searches relating to VE day. The second sleepover had a 'movie' theme where the children had to decorate their sleepover location in a movie theme. We had Star Wars, Harry Potter and Mickey Mouse. The Beavers' biggest project has been working with the Epsom and Ewell Foodbank with the children designing posters to ask for donations and then popping a box outside their house to receive items. It has been very successful, and we were given lovely food and toiletry donations as well as cash so we could buy lots of toothbrushes.

Cubs have been very busy this term and have all worked extremely hard. They made Bug Hotels and grew sunflowers as part of their Gardening Badge. They also made some very beautiful Dream Jars (anyone read or seen The Big Friendly Giant will know where the idea came from), some of

which were very creative indeed. In addition, they completed the Scientist Badge by performing lots of experiments, with some very varied results. Thoroughly enjoyable but often very messy.

Another Badge they completed out of the weekly sessions was their Home Help Badge. Lots of the Cubs proved very helpful for their parents by cleaning windows, making their beds and washing the dishes. They also had to make their parents an evening meal, indeed one Cub cooked his parents a steak as part of a 3-course meal!!

All their hard worked paid off when we celebrated by having a badge presentation ceremony, when a total of 130 badges were awarded, all delivered to each Cub's house prior to the presentation evening. Holding a badge award ceremony online was challenging, however, all went well, and one Cub even participated whilst on holiday in France.



Scouts This term the Scouts have tried several different challenging activities such as making paper airplanes using several different designs to observe how subtle changes can affect greater distance and more stable flight. The Scouts captured the flights on video and uploaded it to share on the meeting evening. We also ran a photography badge over two weeks showing the Scouts how the use of settings such as shutter speeds and aperture can create different effects. Some of the results were very pleasing and have been uploaded onto our Scouts' Facebook page

The Scouts also took part in an online treasure hunt challenge against the Cubs, each section's children guiding their respective Leaders around the local area via a mobile video link to our online Zoom meeting; a kind of 'Challenge Anneka' evening. Amazingly the technology worked very well with no real problems and the Scouts really enjoyed the evening, but it would be unsporting to say who won!

Finally, in the last two weeks the Scouts have been designing their own marble run using cardboard, plastic bottles, newspaper and other recyclable materials to create a gravity maze for a marble to travel along. The winner is the design that can keep the marble moving for the longest time without stopping. Currently it stands at 1 minute 8 seconds with a run that travelled all through the house and into the garden; an amazing construction that must have taken several days to construct.

Foodbank Update. Dear All, as always I hope you are safe and well.

This week saw the start of the long summer holidays and with it an increase in our numbers. As we have done in previous years, we will be supporting families who would normally benefit from free school meals. This means an increase in the demand for 'child friendly' food. Whilst we aim to provide a nutritious food package it also nice to include snacks and treats.

It is not only children who like a sweet treat as many of our elderly clients ask for biscuits and chocolate. One has a particular liking for Jamie Dodgers 😊

Another thing worth mentioning is that if donating things like ketchup both small and large bottles would be appreciated. We do cater for many single people in addition to larger family units.

This week we have fed more than 260 people and made over 100 home deliveries.

As previously mentioned, we do have a very good stock of many of the basic items so if possible please donate only the items on the following list:-

Shaving foam
Cleaning products - bleach, anti bac sprays etc

Sugar - small bags if possible

Children's treats - chocolate etc
Savoury snacks - crisps etc
Powdered milk
Washing powder/tablets/capsules/liquid - URGENT
Peanut butter - URGENT
Nappies - size 5 and above only please

The majority of supermarkets still have collection bins which we empty on a regular basis. Alternatively, food can be dropped off at our warehouse at the Generation Resource Centre behind West Ewell Primary School, Ruxley Lane, Ewell KT19 0JG. We are open Monday to Friday 9:00am to 3:00pm for dropping donations, except Thursday when last time for donations is 2:00pm. Please note that we do not open on Bank Holidays. A Man Devoted to God

Job was a man who lived in Uz. He was honest inside and out, a man of his word, who was totally devoted to God and hated evil with a passion. He had seven sons and three daughters. He was also very wealthy—seven thousand head of sheep, three thousand camels, five hundred teams of oxen, five hundred donkeys, and a huge staff of servants—the most influential man in all the East!

His sons used to take turns hosting parties in their homes, always inviting their three sisters to join them in their merrymaking. When the parties were over, Job would get up early in the morning and sacrifice a burnt offering for each of his children, thinking, “Maybe one of them sinned by defying God inwardly.” Job made a habit of this sacrificial atonement, just in case they’d sinned.

The First Test: Family and Fortune

One day when the angels came to report to God, Satan, who was the Designated Accuser, came along with them. God singled out Satan and said, “What have you been up to?”

Satan answered God, “Going here and there, checking things out on earth.”

God said to Satan, “Have you noticed my friend Job? There’s no one quite like him—honest and true to his word, totally devoted to God and hating evil.”

Satan retorted, “So do you think Job does all that out of the sheer goodness of his heart? Why, no one ever had it so good! You pamper him like a pet, make sure nothing bad ever happens to him or his family or his possessions, bless everything he does—he can’t lose!

“But what do you think would happen if you reached down and took away everything that is his? He’d curse you right to your face, that’s what.”

God replied, “We’ll see. Go ahead—do what you want with all that is his. Just don’t hurt him.” Then Satan left the presence of God.

Sometime later, while Job’s children were having one of their parties at the home of the oldest son, a messenger came to Job and said, “The oxen were ploughing and the donkeys grazing in the field next to us when Sabeans attacked. They stole the animals and killed the field hands. I’m the only one to get out alive and tell you what happened.”

While he was still talking, another messenger arrived and said, "Bolts of lightning struck the sheep and the shepherds and fried them—burned them to a crisp. I'm the only one to get out alive and tell you what happened."

While he was still talking, another messenger arrived and said, "Chaldeans coming from three directions raided the camels and massacred the camel drivers. I'm the only one to get out alive and tell you what happened."

While he was still talking, another messenger arrived and said, "Your children were having a party at the home of the oldest brother when a tornado swept in off the desert and struck the house. It collapsed on the young people and they died. I'm the only one to get out alive and tell you what happened."

Job got to his feet, ripped his robe, shaved his head, then fell to the ground and worshiped:

Naked I came from my mother's womb,
naked I'll return to the womb of the earth.
God gives, God takes.
God's name be ever blessed.

Not once through all this did Job sin; not once did he blame God.

Rend Collective
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Reflection

When I say 'God is faithful', what does that mean to you?

For me, I think it means that when God makes a promise, he doesn't back out of it. Some of us may have been promised something by God in the past – I know I have – and even when it seems like it won't come true, we can hold on to the fact that God is faithful and will come through on the promise.

We hear that Job was a righteous man, described as a man who was blameless and upright, a man who feared God and turned away from evil. God was so certain about Job's righteousness that he allowed Satan to put Job to the test. Job lost everything – his possessions, his livestock, his servants, even his own family.

And yet, despite being put through all this, Job remains steadfast – chapter 1 verses 20-21: "And Job arose, and tore his robe and shaved his head. And fell on the ground and worshipped. And he

said, 'Naked I came from my mother's womb and naked shall I return. The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord.'" (ESV)

And on it goes. Throughout Job's story, after losing everything, even his own health is attacked - yet still he remains steadfast in the Lord. He cries out to God, who seems both close and far away at the same time. And at the end of the book, God replies.

This is a slightly paraphrased version of what God said to Job:

"I will ask you some questions then I want you to answer me:
Where were you when I laid the Earth's foundation?
Who measured it? What was it built on?
Who created the ocean? Who caused it to be born?
I put clouds over it as if they were its clothes.
I wrapped it in thick darkness.
I set limits for it and said, "You can come this far but you can't come any farther.
Here is where your proud waves have to stop."

Job, have you ever commanded the morning to come?
Have you ever shown the sun where to rise?
Have you travelled to the springs at the bottom of the ocean?
Have you walked in its deepest parts? Have the gates of death been shown to you?
Have you seen the gates of darkness? Do you understand how big the Earth is?
Where does lightning come from? Where do the winds live?
Who tells the rain where it should fall? Who makes paths for the thunderstorms?

Does the rain have a father? Who is the father of the drops of dew?
Does the ice have a mother? Who is the mother of the frost from the heavens?
Can you give orders to the clouds? Can you make them pour rain down on you?
Do you send the lightning bolts on their way? Do they report to you, 'Here we are'?

Who put wisdom in people's hearts? Who gave understanding to their minds?
Who is wise enough to count the clouds? Who can tip over the water jars of the heavens?
Do you hunt for food for mother lions? Do you satisfy the hunger of their cubs?
Who provides food for ravens when their babies cry out?"

And he asked Job many other questions. Then the Lord said, "I am the Mighty One. Will the man who argues with me correct me? Let him who brings charges against me answer me!"

Job replied, "I am not worthy. How can I reply to you? I am putting my hand over my mouth. I will stop talking. I know that you can do anything. No one can keep you from doing what you plan to do.

God was faithful to Job. He never left Job, even if it may have seemed like it at the time. Job knew about God's faithfulness; even in the pit of his anguish he was able to say, from Chapter 19 verses 25 and 26, "I know that my Redeemer lives, and after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God." (ESV)

You might think that the book of Job quite a depressing one, yet when you look closer into it, I think it is actually encouraging. Scholars are divided on whether the book of Job is a true account of a man who had all these events happen to him, or whether it is completely allegorical writing, stories passed on from generation to generation with a sound message at its core. It may be a mixture of the two. But to be honest, it doesn't really matter - it shows us that no matter what life can throw at us, God is faithful to us and will keep us close to him. It also shows us why we should remain faithful to God.

Looking at Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, particularly the bit where he writes: "A thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to harass me, to keep me from becoming conceited. Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that it should leave me. But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.'" (ESV) We don't know what Paul's thorn was, and, like the historical accuracy of Job, it doesn't really matter. Aside from his thorn, Paul went through many trials himself - he writes about the number of times he was imprisoned and shipwrecked, left hungry, and subjected to torturous punishment.

Although these experiences of Paul and what Job went through might be far removed from our own experiences, the faithful response from God is the same to us when he says: "My grace is sufficient for you."

When we look at some of the hymns and songs that have been written throughout the generations, it might be surprising to see how many have been written in times of turmoil. One famous one is the hymn 'When peace like a river', potentially better known from its refrain: 'It is well with my soul.' The writer of this hymn, Horatio Spafford, experienced some great tragedy in his life, first his young son died from scarlet fever. A few years later, his wife and four daughters were on a ship crossing the Atlantic when it collided with another ship and sank within a matter of minutes, and only his wife survived. On his crossing of the Atlantic after hearing the news, and passing the place where his daughters died, the first draft of this hymn was written.

Another example, and given below, is the song 'Blessed be your name'. Matt and Beth Redman wrote this song in part shortly after the events of 9-11, but also after Beth had a number of miscarriages. On a more personal level, a few years ago in my home church, we had a service where the congregation were asked to pick songs and hymns which had special meanings from their time in the past years. A lady in the church who lost one of her twin boys to a cot death around thirty years earlier chose it as her song. You'll see that some of the words are word-for-word taken from our reading from Job earlier – the Lord gives, the Lord takes away; blessed be the name of the Lord.

One of the key parts that all these songs have in common is that they come up with the ending that God's grace is sufficient, that he is all-powerful, that he is faithful.

A prayer

The chorus of the song Everlasting God (StF 46) has these words:

*Yesterday, today, and forever
You are the same – You never change.
Yesterday, today, and forever,
You are faithful, and we will trust in you.*

We thank you, Lord, that you don't change, that you are faithful. We are thankful that your grace is sufficient, and always there for us, so whatever we may face, whatever life may throw our way, we can trust in your promises. Amen.

Something to think about:

At the end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples, and us, that He is with us to the end of the age. Is God being faithful, or is this an empty promise?
